If you see water where it should not be, please notify Dan Fritz (phone) so that he can check it out.

All of the bacteriological water samples this past quarter have been negative. All of our required chemical tests have returned results within the approved limits.

There have been a few hiccups in the annual MLIA billing process, but our new Treasurer, Mary Ladewig, is working through the process. A few questions that have arisen and the board will be addressing the issues to bring clarity to the process.

I am working with the Forest Service to try and format a form that can be used to request septic tank replacement or repair and can be used to document the repair request progress towards approval. Seems that the septic tanks mandated by the Forest Service to be installed 20 to 25 years ago are now in need of repair or replacement. There have been problems/delays getting approval from the Forest Service due to agency resources and turnover. There has also been some confusion regarding the

information needed by the Forest Service to ensure the approval process is not delayed. We have a new Recreation Residence Program Administrator, Madison Ayde. I am hoping we can make quick work towards getting this repair request form approved so that the cabin owners in need will have a tool to help them and the Forest Service through the approval process.

We continue to have our quarterly MLIA board meetings via Zoom and probably will continue to do so. They are more convenient than in-person and we get good participation. We will have to wait and see if the Forest Service will allow usage of the Red-Tailed Roost for meetings. *Only the Shadow knows!*



KEEPING THE ROADS CLEAR AND CLEAN

The rain and snow event of mid-Dec did not involve the flurry of snow players that has happened in the past. I was there before, during, and after the storm and saw little to no visitors cruising our cabin access roads. This was a good test of previous clean up activities as it relates to run off dispersal. My drive around found no serious gullies or pot holes needing repair.

Still no word from the Forest Service on an eventual permit allowing MLIA to perform it's own maintenance on our access routes. Do you ever notice the large cloud of dust coming up from the rear of your car or truck? That is the roadway blowing away. Eventually our water lines will be exposed. An SDGE claim was recently filed for a water line pulled up that was only 2" deep. It did not begin that way. The Forest Service does not replace the degraded road base as it should and will not support us in doing it our way for them. So, we work defensively, fixing as we go.

Let me know if you have any questions about how to fix a poor runoff situation. You almost need to be out there in the rain to see how things happen to determine how to fix it. There is great satisfaction in making the fix during the rain and the instant gratification it provides. Either way, I love my job but the pay sucks!!




But before the snow and ice . . .

The brush pile at Camp Ole has NEW hours of operation. The new hours are 9:30 am to 4:30pm. The brush pile access is subject to closure due to bad weather and/or bad road conditions. Please follow the rules for using the brush pile and keep this area clean.

During this winter, it is a good time to check your heater and fireplace flues and dampers for proper operation and that they are free of any obstructions and soot build-up. Test all smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors and replace the batteries if they are older than one year. Please check your detector manual for requirements to replace batteries.

As a reminder, SDG&E will set-up power Community Resource Centers (CRC) during a Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) or an emergency evacuation of our community. Check the SDG&E website for exact locations of these charging stations. The SDG&E website shows these CRC locations, outage maps, weather reports, area cameras and power shutdown status. Be sure to sign up for weather and power outage warnings and alerts to your cell phone and email through your SDG&E online account.

- Winter is still the time to keep your roof gutters clean and keep the leaves from piling up around your house and in the valleys of your roof.
